Big Funding Boost for Vocational Training

The big news for this month is the \$57 million training package that the McGowan

government has announced. It aims to reduce training fees while providing a path to employment.

Free Short Courses

There are 15 free short courses as part of the package. These free skill sets¹ will get students ready for new jobs and provide pathways to full qualifications.



I have heard the media talk about these courses as "micro-credentials".

They include:

- infection control skill sets,
- hospitality,
- logistics,
- cybersecurity,

- agriculture,
- civil construction and
- small business.

Many of the short courses have built-in foundation digital skills and literacy and numeracy training.

Skills sets are a selection of key units chosen from a full qualification that will make you jobready. When you have passed these units, you can use them as credit towards a full qualification later.


Fees reduced between 50% and 67% for 27 Certificate level qualifications

¹ Skills Set = industry recognized skills sets that are part of a full certificate or diploma. For example, the <u>Agricultural Chemicals Skills Set</u> is part of an Agriculture, Horticulture, Conservation and Land Management qualification. The Skills Set teaches students to transport and store chemicals and to Prepare and apply chemicals to control pest, weeds and diseases.

Income @ Qualifications

There is a lot of heady discussion about why young people are choosing degrees over VET qualifications.

It may be as simple as looking at long term career earnings.

Bachelor's degree graduates earn about 30% more than VET graduates.

School leavers without any further qualifications only earn 58% of that earned by people with degrees.

WARNING:

This is a very clunky assessment. Childcare workers and electricians both have certificates, yet the salary difference is significant.

Fine Arts degree graduates and Actuaries both have a bachelor's degree, yet the salary difference is significant.



The Reality of Careers in Music

The <u>Making Music Work</u> report shows that 97% of musicians are doing what they love and 52% receive income from non-music sources.

The vast majority of Australian musicians undertake a portfolio career which encompasses concurrent and often impermanent roles. This is not a new phenomenon but in recent decades there have been <u>major shifts</u> in how music is made, paid for and consumed.

The research found 560 different job titles, the most common being instrumental musician (25%) and private music teacher (10%). Musicians worked in music-related



jobs as disparate as composers, sound technicians and community arts workers, and nonmusic jobs including sales assistants, journalists, and librarians.

RRR Tertiary Education Strategy Funding Available \$\$\$\$

This is more information about the <u>Regional, Rural and Remote Tertiary Education Strategy</u> that I mentioned in the July issue. Sorry, it is not another bucket of money!!

Tertiary Access Payment

This aims to encourage school leavers to go straight into a tertiary study of Certificate IV and above. They will receive a \$5000 payment to assist their transition.

A guaranteed place for Indigenous students from regional Australia

An additional 160 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from regional and remote areas will benefit from a guaranteed a Commonwealth supported place at a university of their choice, where they are accepted by the university into the course of study.

Improved Fares Allowance

The Fares Allowance waiting period will be reduced from six months to three months to allow relocated tertiary students to return home during their mid-year break in their first year of study.

Reform of equity funding

From 2021, the Higher Education Participation and Partnerships Program (HEPPP) will include regional and remote students as a key target group in the distribution of access and equity funding through the HEPPP.

Enhanced research capacity of Regional Universities

The Government is establishing an annual grants program for regional universities to enable them to develop research partnerships with other education providers or local industry.



She said of the Cannington Ed Support Centre:



They come in annually. We tailor the talk to what they are doing at school that relates to construction. Last year they were making 3D houses from actual plans they had drawn up.

I was so impressed as I doubt most mainstream schools were doing what these guys are. This year they are about to design a concrete path to go around the school.






ABCN

The newly formed National Skills Commission (NSC) has released their first publication, <u>A</u> snapshot in time: Australia's Labour Market and COVID-19.


I am sure this research was planned before COVID-19 hit so it is an enormous coincidence that this information has arrived just as it is needed.

In May, the Mandurah Region had the highest unemployment figures in the state at 7.6% with youth unemployment coming in at 19% which is marginally behind the Perth South West Region with 19.4% youth unemployment.

The Wheatbelt has the best figures with just 3.1% unemployment overall and 8.2% youth unemployment.


Many of the <u>free Skills Sets training programs</u> that have just been announced aim at quickly preparing people for jobs that will be available in the Wheatbelt.

The Case for Better Career Education

Stephen Joyce, who did the <u>VET Review Research Report</u> points to a disconnect between education and training completed (doing or planned) and the job aspirations of young people.

Joyce is concerned that many students' career aspirations were not aligned with their educational plan, which could leave them overqualified.



Underqualified Overqualified

For example, as shown in the chart, 45 per cent of those surveyed intended to complete a bachelor level degree, when they need a certificate. Others risk under qualification - 33 per cent intending to pursue a VET pathway when they need a bachelor's degree.

According to the TAFE Directors Newsletter (13th July):

The Business Council of Australia for some time has been asking for joined-up information for all occupations and all post-school learning pathways.

Now THAT could lead to better-informed career advice.

Workforce-ready: challenges and opportunities for VET

Careers educators can probably skip reading this whole discussion paper.

It talks about the importance of "employability" skills and about the capacity of the VET sector to deliver both the technical skills and the employability skills required by industry.



The key factors that I got from it are:

- The new National Skills Commission will undertake research and analysis of future skills needs of Australian industry.
- .There is increasing demand from employers that applicants for apprenticeships already demonstrate some of these skills. Pre apprenticeships can deliver these skills.
- COVID-19 has inspired action that includes:
 - Additional funding to the VET system. /
 - the development of a sub-committee of the Australian Industry and Skills
 Committee (AISC) to drive the rapid and flexible development of training
 packages during the crisis (Cash & Irons 2020a)
 - the provision of heavily subsidised short online higher education courses in national priority areas (Tehan & Cash 2020)

The rapid response by the VET sector demonstrates its ability to be flexible and responsive. This capacity is what is needed for Australian industry to maintain currency through training as technology and knowledge demands emerge.

Employability Skills

Not only is the demand for these (employability) skills increasing, the diversity by which nontechnical skills are described appears to be ever-growing.

For example, the Select Committee on the Future of Work and Workers heard that employers are looking for graduates with the following skills

(University of Technology Sydney, in Senate Select committee on the Future of Work and Workers 2018, submission 81, p.3):

- o sense-making
- o social intelligence
- o novel and adaptive thinking
- o cross-cultural competency
- o computational thinking
- o *new-media literacy*
- o transdisciplinary
- o knowledge/skills
- o design mindset
- o cognitive load management
- o virtual collaboration

Lots of Applications for the Careers Grants

There has been a strong response to the first round of grants offered by the National Careers Institute (NCI) which attracted more than 500 applications.

The program will provide grants ranging from \$20,000 to \$700,000 for up to two years to industry, employers, schools and tertiary institutions to deliver innovative approaches to careers advice.

I keep an electronic copy of your newsletter and have been able to go back to find dates and contact information during interviews with students and their parents.
