THE COVID GENERATION

It was the first time I heard the term *COVID Generation*. She said that people coming of age and looking for their first job in a severe economic downturn suffer significant long term negative impacts. She urged the development of resilient systems that reduce these negative impacts.

ALERT

She said we should watch for people who are disengaging. <u>Beyond Blue</u> and <u>LifeLine</u> have early intervention programs that can quickly suggest coping skills. CALD communities are particularly at risk.

BUILD BACK BETTER

It was also the first time I had heard of the Build Back Better movement which is gaining traction. There was background chat about a Universal Basic Income (UBI) to support The COVID Generation.



Students will automatically be awarded the scholarship if they:

• achieve an ATAR in the top 10 per cent of their school cohort (ATAR greater than 60)

- list a UWA course as their 1st preference through TISC in the December round offers, and
- completed Year 12 at a regional, remote or <u>targeted metropolitan school</u>, are Indigenous or participated in <u>Fairway UWA</u>

This scholarship also provides an alternative pathway for students to attend UWA who wouldn't have otherwise been eligible.

UWA PRINCIPAL'S CITIZENSHIP AWARD

The <u>UWA Principal's Citizenship Award</u> recognises an outstanding Year 12 WACE student who is nominated by their principal as most likely to succeed at university due to his or her resilience, exemplary scholarly attributes and/or contributions to the school and broader community.

The UWA Principal's Citizenship Award, valued at \$1,500, is replacing the UWA Excellence Award from 2019. Eligibility requirements of this new and exciting award have been expanded to encompass a diverse range of student attributes worthy of recognition.

Curtin Application Process

3-step TISC application process

Applications to Curtin University are submitted through TISC.

View the **<u>TISC important dates</u>** page for key deadlines.

- Step 1. Students submit their application through TISC.
- **Step 2.** Our admissions team sends year 12s a personalised email with the outcome of their application and advice on the next step.
- **Step 3.** Students will be advised to:

a) accept their conditional offer

b) wait to receive their end-of-year results before receiving an offer (competitive courses)

OR

c) submit a portfolio to support their application.

<u>HorizonsPlus Pathway</u> – alternative entry pathway where students can spend 4weeks on campus in January and gain entry into most 70 selection rank courses while earning 3 credit points towards their MU Degree

<u>Murdoch Ready</u> – All Year 12s graduating this year who achieve WACE and enrol in a fulltime Bachelor's degree at Murdoch next year are eligible for a \$1,000 financial support package and have three to choose from (Tech Ready, Campus Life Ready, and Commute Ready)

<u>Widened Portfolio Entry</u> – students are now eligible to apply using a Portfolio pathway for most of Murdoch's 70 selection rank courses. They must demonstrate their aptitude, receiving a letter of recommendation by a principal or senior teacher, and write a personal statement as well as achieve WACE and demonstrate ELC

<u>Year 12 Uni Entry Safety Net</u> – Students can apply directly to Murdoch now and receive a conditional or unconditional offer based on achievement in their current pathway.

The Good Universities Guide to Nursing

The <u>Good Universities Guide</u> has written about the best universities to study nursing.

Two West Australian universities were among the top ranking. <u>Notre Dame</u> took top place for Skills Development with a 93% satisfaction rate.



<u>Curtin</u> ranked second on graduate salary with students earning a salary of \$64,700, not far behind the <u>University of Southern Queensland</u> which took the top spot with a median salary of \$65,200 a year.







COVID Generation Learnings

In early August <u>The Australia Institute</u> put on a webinar called <u>The Pandemic, Mental Health</u> <u>and Beyond</u> with Julia Gillard as the keynote speaker. She is now Chair of <u>Beyond Blue</u> and Chair of the Board for the <u>Global Partnership for Education</u> so naturally much of the conversation was about mental health issues during the pandemic and about education.




KEY TAKEAWAYS

- Social researchers have identified a <u>COVID Generation</u> of young people coming of age into an economic downturn. There is evidence that there will be long term negative economic impact on the COVID Generation.
- Financial insecurity and social disconnection were significant contributors to mental health issues. Both are experienced by school leavers.
- There was a lot of background chat about the need for a Universal Basic Income.
- Preexisting issues that have been managed by vulnerable people are now surfacing.
 Watch for students of CALD families. RRR students were also given a special mention.
- Stepped care for early intervention has been introduced by organisations like <u>Beyond</u>
 <u>Blue</u> to support people who are feeling down BEFORE they get depressed.

- Government-supported access to psychologists and psychiatrists has doubled.
 People can now have 20 visits under Medicare. (Although many of the Chat participants said that there were still significant out of pocket expenses per visit.)
- There is a return of trust in experts, and governments.

James Whiting from Orygen wrote <u>this article in the CDAA newsletter</u> this month. It is called *Finding Ways to Cope: Opportunities for Young People in an Unpredictable Job Market* and it delivers some useful and reassuring advice for those of us in the careers world.

Research

Peter Shergold: Review of Secondary School Pathways

This is the Gonski for preparing students school transition.

The <u>Review of Secondary School Pathways</u> is essential professional reading for all involved with senior student education. It is just great to have such a powerful Review to reinforce what we have been saying for a decade.

The TAFE Directors Newsletter (27 July 2020) introduced the Review like this:

Senior secondary students should not be forced to make "binary choices" between university and VET, and should be provided with a more realistic view of the world ahead, according to the federal government's review of senior secondary pathways.



Headed by Professor Peter Shergold, the review, <u>Looking to the Future</u>, finds that many students at Year 10 are required to choose an inflexible pathway, either in an "academic stream" or a "vocational stream".

It says the binary decisions that students are often forced to make reinforce stereotypical assumptions about relative prestige, and "give a false expectation of the world ahead".

"Research suggests that although two-thirds of students have aspirations of a professional or paraprofessional occupation by age 30, these types of positions only represent a third of available job opportunities," the report says.

"This helps to explain why so many graduates later undertake vocational courses provided by TAFEs and other registered training organisations."

Learner Profile

It recommends the adoption of **Learner Profile** – *a much broader measure than the* **ATAR** *which would include a range of student skills, knowledge and experience, such as* work experience, volunteering and personal achievement.

"The singular dominance of the ATAR is unlikely to survive COVID-19," the report says.

Education Passport

It urges the creation of a digital **Education Passport** for lifelong learning to allow young people to capture progressively their education and training qualifications and workplace experience.

The report found "many instances of poor practice" with **VET-in-schools**, and says it should only be done in a high-quality way, otherwise it should be undertaken externally.

The government says it will consider the recommendations of the review and work with the states and territories on a response through Education Council. *Career guidance* within and outside schools should be strengthened significantly and accorded higher status.

Guiding Principles for Career Development (Second Edition)

<u>These Principles</u> are designed as a quality improvement mechanism that can help you to improve career development work in Australia. There is a Checklist in Appendix A which will help you to self-assess.

If you need any help with establishing your school's plan for achieving these Principles give me a ring. If we get one model, we can then share it across schools.



The Career Industry Council of Australia has created a framework that guides and supports careers work in Australia.

• The Australian Blueprint for Career Development was the first part of this framework.

- Then a set of <u>Professional Standards</u> was developed. I have heard international leaders in career development praise these standards for mentioning equity and diversity. We are advised to integrate this into our practices.
- Finally, there is a set of <u>Guiding Principles</u> and a Second Edition has just been released.

Higher Level Apprenticeships

Western Australia may be about to look at a new model of apprenticeships, following the release of the <u>Review of Skills, Training and Workforce Development</u>.

The review recommends radical reforms to the apprenticeship system, including "dual and combo trades", and shortened apprenticeships in non-licensed trades.

"Many industries including resources, agriculture, defence and civil construction are seeing the need for highly skilled individuals with skills crossing two or more traditional trades," the review said.

It recommends new apprenticeships in civil plant operations, truck driving, rail and civil infrastructure, operator and maintainer roles in big industry, and maintenance of autonomous vehicles and equipment.
