



### You can't double dip - VET in schools subject choices

If you do a Certificate III or IV at school, you can't do the same qualification again as a traineeship.

Clearly students don't understand that they may be cutting their options by choosing a VET qualification that they may want to take as a traineeship or preapprenticeship when they leave school.

**EXAMPLE**: If you do a Certificate III in Business at school you cannot then apply for a Certificate III in Business traineeship when you finish school.

Students are going to the <u>Australian Apprentice Support Network</u> providers (the ones that provide information and advice about the apprenticeship and traineeships) wanting a traineeship or pre apprenticeship when they have already done the qualification at school. Those applicants cannot be offered a position in that field.

VET is schools provides students with options to broaden their horizons, but they can also limit the choice of courses taken after school.

With the number of apprentices and trainees dropping by half in recent years it will be interesting to see what impact the advertising campaign will have.



The VET sector has had \$3 BILLION cut from its budget in recent years as funding to universities has boomed.

An advertising campaign, without adequately resourcing VET courses, will not address the drift to university.

Nor will an advertising campaign assure that there are on-the-job training places for apprentices and trainees. Subsidies for employers to take on apprentices and trainees won't work unless there is work for the apprentices and trainees to do.



- To provide a lifelong framework, commencing in upper primary school
- To develop standards and rate schools (linked to funding) on their career services.
- To ensure that careers is not fighting against other academic areas of study which it is at present.

I wrote: Minimum Career Practitioners standards, coordinating data which includes not only where the job shortages are but what skills/qualities etc that you need for these jobs, Rating RTO providers like we do with the uni's.


Bridges to the Future - Sent through by Michael Openshaw

It has been done in the context of the NSW Curriculum Review.


There seems to be a lot coming through about the need for greater integration of practical and workplace learning.

### **Joyce Review**



By now you will have heard of the Joyce Review which is providing direction for VET for this government. It is the Joyce Review which advocated the creation of a National Skills Commission and a National Careers Institute.

The Review's 71 recommendations cover six broad areas:

1. strengthening quality assurance;

- 2. speeding up qualification development;
- 3. simpler funding and skills matching;
- 4. better career information;
- 5. clearer secondary school pathways; and
- 6. greater access for disadvantaged Australians.


